NEW LOCATION SIGNS AT THE COLLEGE

After considerable consultation and graphic design, I am pleased to say that we have installed four new site maps to allow better access and directions in our vast and beautiful property. I particularly thank Mr Saranga De Alwis our Development Manager and Mr Peter Reardon (Old Boy and Parent) from Pipeline Designs for their contribution. I trust that these signs will help many people better navigate our large and complex place.

NEW CRICKET FACILITIES

Those who have driven along Sandy Camp Road may have noticed the redevelopment of our cricket facilities through the installation of eight new practice nets. It has been approximately 15 years since the last nets were installed and cricket continues to be one of the most anticipated and supported of our sports at the College. After extensive research from professional cricket facilities, I am confident that these new nets will serve our community well. They are due for completion shortly.



UPDATES ON NEW FACILITY DEVELOPMENTS

During the week, I sent an email to all families indicating the Council community consultation processes involved in three proposed new developments over the next number of years. These facilities include: new pool, new tennis courts, club and change rooms, canteens, pavilions, grandstands, indoor sports stadium and gathering hall. BOARD APPROVED FACILITY REDEVELOPMENTS AND DECISIONS

On Monday evening, the College Board met for its monthly meeting. Among the many areas of discussion were four projects that are due for completion over the end of year school holiday period. The four new projects are:

- Increased size and facility upgrade of the Sick Bay in its current area (along with a new name in 2017).
- Relocation and development of a new Student Hub for administration and welfare. This will be located in the bottom floor of the Davine Building and will include; student reception, Dean of Students, Chaplain, Heads of Wellbeing and appropriate meeting and gathering spaces.
- Relocation and development of an expanded Learning Centre for students of diverse needs on the top floor of the Davine Building. This new facility will provide a wide range of learning environments for students with special and diverse needs.
- Re-roofing the Shortall Building and installing air conditioning in the top floor classrooms. This installation will complete air conditioning in all teaching spaces in the College and has been planned for some time.

All of these projects will provide direct and necessary benefits to the students and staff of the College. This is essentially where the Capital Projects Contribution that so many of you make is put to use.

As I hope you are aware, the College takes great care in maintaining fees that are as accessible to working families as we possibly can. A quick scan of like schools, or sister schools will show that Iona's fees offer exceptional value for money and a genuine investment into your son's educational journey.

The suggested amount of \$700 per family will remain voluntary for 2017, however, a greater request is made to those families who can support an increase to their contribution. The facilities that we presently enjoy have come from the contributions of families from the past, and as the current custodians of this community, there is a genuine need for this generation to contribute as best they can. This will be more formally communicated next year when the Capital Projects Contributions are sent out early in the year.

The College fee structure is close to completion for 2017 and, as in previous years, we have kept fee increases to approximately 5.5%. This amount maintains our position of providing a quality education at an affordable fee. Any family facing genuine financial difficulties remains invited to speak with the finance team to ensure the best possible approach can be navigated.

PROVINCIAL COUNCIL GATHERING

This week has also seen the gathering of the Oblate Provincial Council here at Iona College. The Provincial Council consists of our Provincial (Fr Peter Daly OMI, Fr Christian Fini OMI, Fr Andrew Chen OMI, Fr John McGinty OMI (and myself) and meets throughout the year to try and support the Oblates of Australia and China and at the same time try and ensure that our Oblate works continue to be inspired by St Eugene de Mazenod. Please keep the Oblates in your prayers.

LEARNING AND TEACHING

IMPLEMENTATION OF THE NEW SENIOR SYSTEM

This week the Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority (QCAA) announced the decision to delay the implementation of the new senior system.

Instead of being implemented with Year 11 in 2018 (our current Year 9 students), the new system will be introduced with Year 11, 2019 (our current Year 8 students). This means the first graduates of the new system will finish Year 12 in 2020. Our current Year 9 students will now be the last cohort to receive an OP.

The reason given for this delay was because, despite the significant progress already made towards the new system, some transition activities will require more time than originally planned. In particular, significant time is being required to redevelop the senior syllabuses and to deliver the necessary training to the state's teachers.

The Queensland Government has, therefore, decided to introduce the new system a year later than originally outlined. The government's final position can be viewed on the <u>Department of Education and Training website</u>.

It is hopeful the extension of time will ensure that schools have sufficient time and support to become completely familiar with the new system. It will also allow the QCAA to analyse the findings of assessment trials and consult further with schools and education partners.

As a College, we will continue to prepare for effective implementation of the new system, including by advising our community of any changes or updates as they are made available to us.

FAITH AND MISSION

ARCHBISHOP COLERIDGE RESPONDS TO THE LATEST ABORTION BILL INTRODUCED INTO QUEENSLAND PARLIAMENT Written by Mark Bowling, The Catholic Leader, October 19, 2016

Abortion would be treated as a trivial procedure despite the surgical risks and great personal significance, Brisbane Archbishop Mark Coleridge has written in response to the latest Abortion Reform Bill introduced into the Queensland Parliament.

The Health (Abortion Law Reform) Amendment Bill 2016 is the second piece of reform legislation introduced this year by abortion advocate Member for Cairns Rob Pyne.

His earlier bill, aimed at decriminalising abortion, was put to the Parliamentary Health Committee, but the Committee recommended it not be passed.

His second bill would widen access to abortion clinics.

Archbishop Coleridge said in his submission to the Committee: "It is true that the majority of the population believe that women should have access to abortion, but it is also true that there is preference for women to have real and immediate access to alternatives to abortion. Even among those who support abortion in principle, many do not support it other than for medical reasons."

A recent Galaxy Poll in Queensland found that 72 per cent of Queenslanders are opposed to abortion after three months.

"Abortion is a procedure with surgical risks and great personal significance. The complete deregulation of abortion up to 24 weeks as embodied in this Bill does not meet the minimal standards of care for women's health."

Archbishop Coleridge's submission is one of more than 1000 lodged with the Committee for evaluation and these are available for viewing on the parliamentary website.

In a submission from the Catholic Medical Guild of St Luke, president Dr Terrence Kent criticised the Bill.

"If this proposed legislation is enacted, then an unborn baby will have no rights. No rights at all.

Likewise, the father of an unborn baby will have no rights regarding the life of his unborn child."

"At 24 weeks of gestation, a baby can exist outside of the mother's womb," he said.

"The media marvels at miracle babies who are born early and show great resilience to survive and even thrive."

"If this legislation is passed, it will mean that babies will be killed in utero or on delivery that will be older than babies living in the homes of their parents or in the nurseries of our maternity hospitals."

It is held in Semester three (i.e. during the Summer holiday period, starting on the 28 November 2026) which allows students to start their degree studies in Semester one 2017. HeyU: Year 12 and Beyond – This publication is designed for Year 12 students. Topics focus on the transition from school to university and include lots of advice from current USQ students. <u>Year 12 and Beyond</u> is worth a read.

UNIVERSITY OF THE SUNSHINE COAST (USC) SNIPPETS

Scholarships at USC – Check out <u>Scholarships</u> for the range of university (academic, sporting and equity) and external scholarships available. The application due date for many (but not all) of these scholarships is 30 November 2016.

UPDATES FROM THE UNIVERSITY OF QUEENSLAND (UQ)

UQ academic scholarships program – There are three categories of academic scholarships –Vice-Chancellor's Scholarships, Excellence Scholarships and Merit Scholarships. You apply for all three on the one online application. You must provide scanned copies of supporting documentation with the online application form. The application due date is 31 October 2016. Details of the application process and FAQs are available at UQ academic scholarship program.

2017 Enhanced Studies Program (ESP) – High achieving Year 11 students are invited to apply for this program for an opportunity to study a university subject in Semester one of Year 12. Applications are now open and will close on 31 October 2016. Visit <u>ESP</u> to download a brochure and to apply.

When will UQ course offers be made? – Offers for 2017 courses to Year 12 students may be made from 21 December 2016. However, the major offer-round for UQ courses will be on 16 January 2017. Any early offers will not be made for high demand programs such as Medicine, Physiotherapy, Dentistry, Vet Science or Midwifery (or related dual programs). Check <u>Course Offer Dates</u> on the QTAC website as this information can change.

UQ College intensive prerequisite courses – These courses in Mathematics B, Biology and Chemistry are delivered between 22 November - 17 December 2016. The results will be sent by UQ College to QTAC in time for the major offer-round on 16 January 2017. Applications can be accessed from <u>UQ College</u>.

UQ College Tertiary Preparation Program (TPP) – This is a bridging program to further study at UQ and other universities for students who do not currently meet the entry requirements for their preferred degree courses. The program is free. There are intakes in January, May and September. Applications are now open for the January intake. For applications forms, visit <u>UQ College</u>.
